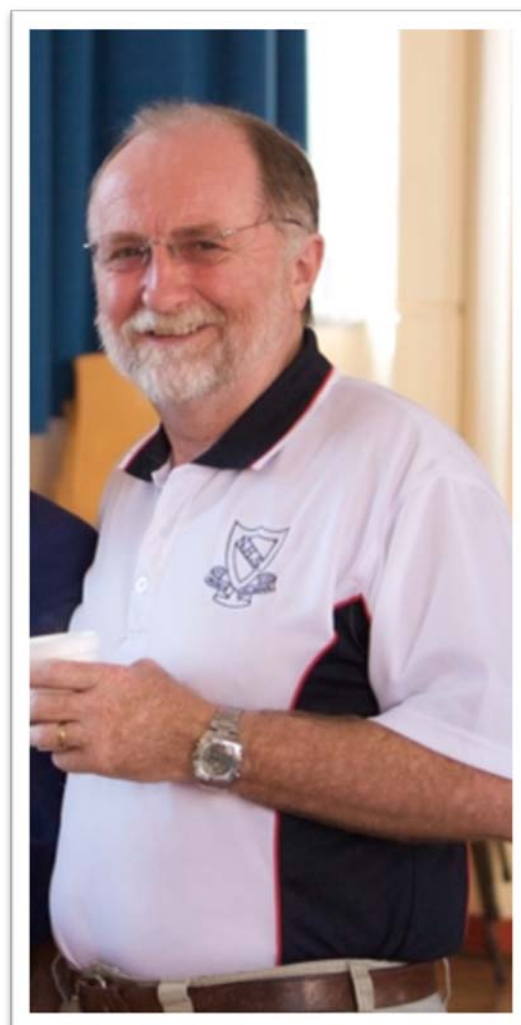

MESSAGE OF THANKS

Over the past 31 years I have had the joy of teaching at Newcastle High School and, as retirement is now at hand, I would like to express my gratitude to all who have made these years so rewarding.

Over this period I have worked with some of the most amazing teachers imaginable. Their dedication to their students and commitment to the school has given these pupils a great start to their life and added to the fabric, character and traditions of the school. Many of these people are my friends and I enjoy the fact that I can walk into any staffroom in the school and be well received with good nature and good humour. I would particularly like to thank and acknowledge my own wonderful staff, some of whom I have worked with going back to 1982 and I will miss them immensely. Initially as an assistant in the Social Sciences faculty, then as a Head Teacher Social Sciences and, more recently, as Head Teacher HSIE, I have been surrounded by excellent colleagues, true friends and steadfast supporters. Their patience, reliability and professionalism have been inspiring and have helped me get through to this stage of my career. They have a collective set of very broad shoulders!

Over the past 12 years I have worked with a remarkably talented team on the school executive. Members of this group have possessed a great sense of cohesion and drive to make the school a better learning environment for students and staff alike. I am in awe of the talents and vision that can be found at our meetings. It is no mean feat to keep a school this size functioning so efficiently and the drive within the leadership group to seek improvement and embrace change has been unfailing. No teacher has ever had a better exit from the service!

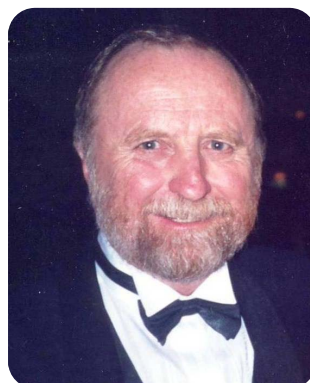

SCIENCE NEWS

Science has been dynamic at Newcastle High School this year. We have had upgraded facilities, a renewed interest in science through the ME program and a multitude of educational opportunities for students in all areas of science. Our involvement in programs for junior students such as Cows Create Careers along with traditional senior excursions to the Wetlands has provided a high level of interest and engagement for our students.

I would like to welcome Ms Shannon Sager to the Science staff. Ms Sager is also the new Head Teacher Welfare and began at the start of Term 4 this year.

Lab Upgrades

All of our Science laboratories have been upgraded with new layouts, furnishings and technology. Our students have been fortunate to be able to work in modern and well resourced laboratories. Students have enjoyed using the new facilities.

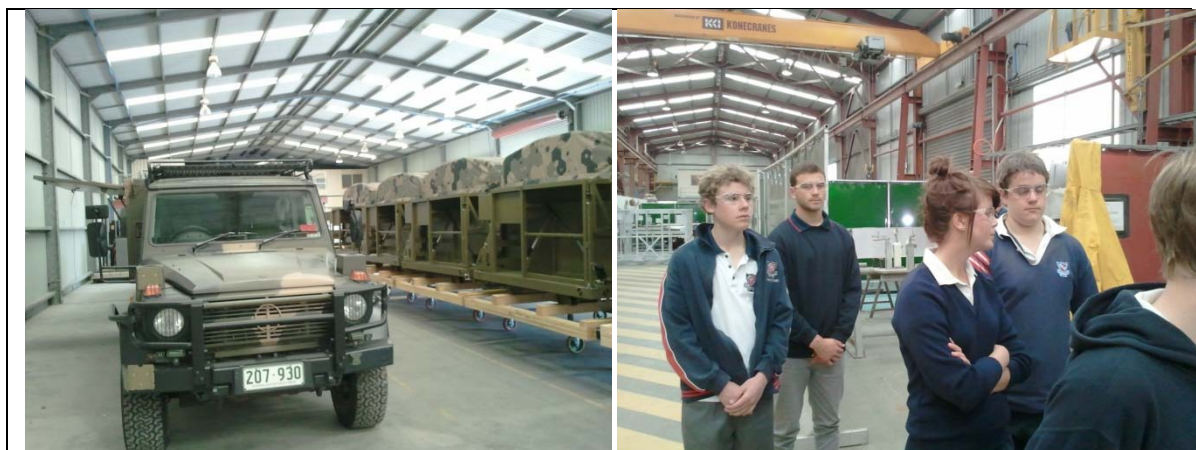
Yr 6 visits

We have provided opportunities for Year 6 students and their parents to experience Science. This included experiments, information nights and tours.

ME program

Newcastle High is participating in the ME program. It is a federal government and industry based initiative that provides opportunities for students to maximise their knowledge of science and engineering in society and promotes careers in these fields. Students have participated in fully funded excursions to universities, Newcastle airport and our Industry partner, Varley Engineering.

- **Build me a future day.** Year 8 students went to the University to compete against other schools, by solving problems and engineering challenges.
- **Varley Engineering visits.** Science staff, Senior Physics, Engineering Studies and Year 10 students have had industry visits looking at military and civilian vehicular engineering.



- **Mechatronics at Uni of Newcastle.** Dr Tristan Perez from the University of Newcastle presented an engineering experience for school students that incorporated bungee jumping, computer simulations and iPad remote control of robots. Students from Newcastle High will be attending this project this term.
- **Newcastle Airport visit.** Year 10 science students interested in aviation careers attended Newcastle Airport and talked to pilots, helicopter businesses, airport staff and the armed forces.



Science and Engineering challenge

Mrs Lidden took 32 Yr 10 Science students to the Science and Engineering Challenge on Monday 25th July at Newcastle Basketball Stadium. Students competed against 5 other schools, designing and constructing solutions to a number of problems. Tasks included bridge building, hovercraft, boat building. The day develops problem solving skills and helps students to work in effective teams.

Cows Create Careers

Thanks to the great work of Mr Doherty this year, the Science faculty has been running the calf rearing program at Newcastle High School. Students from Mr Doherty's and Mr Bromfield's Year 8 classes have been feeding, weighing and caring for 2 calves over a 3 week period. Students learn the fundamentals of animal care and will undertake a program of work examining the principles of agricultural practice.



Mr Doherty's and Mr Bromfield's Yr 8 Science classes went on an excursion to Total Field Studies Centre in the last week of Term 2. Students examined a working dairy, experienced a horse riding demonstration and beef cattle judging procedures. Students then linked with other schools participating in the program and examined careers in agriculture and were thanked for their contributions this year.



BIOLOGY

Museum of Natural History

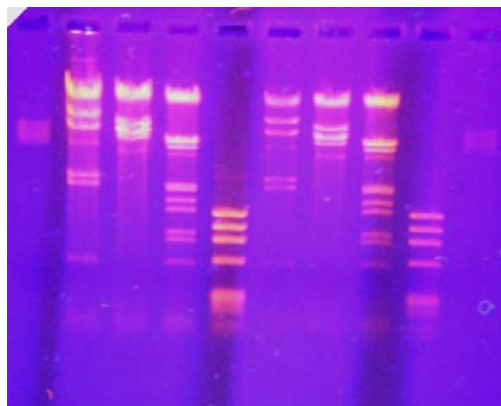
Senior Biology went to the Museum of Natural History in Sydney. Students examined aspects of evolution, genetics and the human story. Mr Doherty and Mr Gotzy were the supervising teachers.

Shortland Wetlands Centre

Preliminary Biology students undertook a field study experience at the Shortland Wetlands Centre. Students examined the wetland's ecosystem, collected samples of vegetation and animal life and applied classroom skills to a field environment.

CSIRO biotechnology

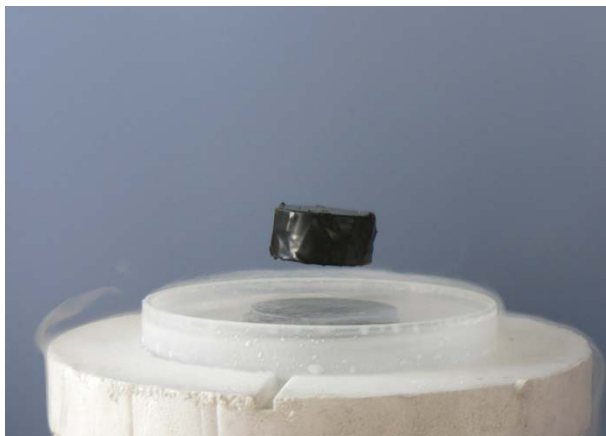
Senior Biology students and selected Year 10 and 9 students will participate on an CSIRO experimental session at Newcastle High that examines genetics and experimental techniques such as electrophoresis.



PHYSICS

Experimentfest

Senior Physics students, accompanied by Mr Rule, attended this day at the University of Newcastle. Students carried out experiments with optics, superconductors, electromagnetism, mechanics and quantum physics. Equipment available to students provided an excellent opportunity to perform complex tasks. Students were shown multiple career paths that utilise physics.



CHEMISTRY

TAFE HSC Chemistry

Mr Southward took his senior Chemistry class to TAFE NSW Hunter Institute Newcastle Campus to experience modern laboratory equipment and experimental techniques. Techniques such as atomic absorption spectroscopy, mass spectroscopy, gas chromatography were able to be used or observed.



PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This is an historic bulletin as on Friday 4th November "The Smith" era ends at Newcastle High School. Mr Mark Smith, the Head Teacher HSIE, commences leave this week prior to retirement after 31 years of service to this school and community. During that time Mark has taught generations of families and over 3,000 students. Mark has been in charge of the Prefect body for many years and has developed countless students into outstanding young leaders who have taken their place in the wider society. A farewell function for Mark is being held this Friday. I am delighted that Mark was convinced to write some recollections for this bulletin. On behalf of the whole school community I wish Mark a long, healthy and satisfying retirement.

Although the term is relatively new, lots have been happening. Last week the school hosted two functions to mark the end of the Middle Schools Writing project. This project saw talented students from two Year 8 English classes paired with Year 5 students from our partner schools. The students worked together to produce a newspaper text. Thanks to Ms Kelly Deakin, from Merewether Public School, who oversaw the whole project and to Ms Ferguson, Mr Edwards and Mrs Myer who looked after the NHS end of the program.



Gifted and talented writers in Years 7 and 8 have participated in a writing project during this term. I was delighted to attend the presentation at the end of the project. It was wonderful to hear young people read and share their work. Hopefully we will publish some of their works in future bulletins.



Music students from Years 10 and 11 had the opportunity to perform at Lizotte's last Monday evening. Mr Gill did a great job co-ordinating the program and the performers and Mr Lewis was a wonderful compere. Well done to the music staff for their work with these talented performers.

Five Year 11 students were selected to attend the regional Talented and Gifted Camp for students commencing their HSC course. A report from the students is included. Well done to the students who attended and again I heard only good reports.

Ms Nowak has been working with a group of students who have been volunteering their time working with elderly residents at Scenic Lodge, assisting them with scrap booking under the 3T program. This program aims to have students share their time and talents and create treasures. These students have been great ambassadors for Newcastle High School. Recently they spoke at a regional conference focussed on volunteering and I was delighted to receive lots of positive feedback after their presentation.

The updated draft of the 2012-2014 School Plan will be tabled at the next P & C meeting. Please come along and make a comment on this plan. Margaret Livingstone, the school chaplain, will also speak to the meeting as the applications for the extension of the chaplaincy program need to be in the Commonwealth government this month. Through her community networks Mrs Livingstone has been running the *Shine* program for a group of Year 7 girls.



Thank you to all the parents who have assisted with the Earn and Learn program sponsored by Woolworths. We collected over 5,000 points and these will be redeemed for essential school supplies, particularly art materials.

The State government is undertaking a review of school facilities. This review is trying to determine what facilities schools need to operate effectively in the 21st century. The Higher School Certificate examinations are completed next week with the last exam on Friday 10th November. The students have behaved well and have done their best in these exams. The results are released to the students on December 14th via Schools Online.

Year 10 students have the details regarding their School Certificate tests next week. Students must be at school on Monday (7th) and Tuesday (8th) for their formal exams and have been allocated a time to attend over the next three days to complete the Computer Skills Test. Students must return to school on Monday 14th November to commence their Senior Entry Certificate courses including the mandatory "All My Own" program. Some students have been given permission to do work experience during these weeks. Year 10 students, like all students in other years, are required to remain at school until the last day of term.

Many families have been contacted by staff from Hunter New England Health as part of *The Healthy Schools Healthy Futures* program. Thank you for your assistance and time with this survey. Many students have been surveyed and during week six another 200 students will be surveyed. All this data will then be analysed and presented to a school working party on November 29th. TERM 4 UPDATE

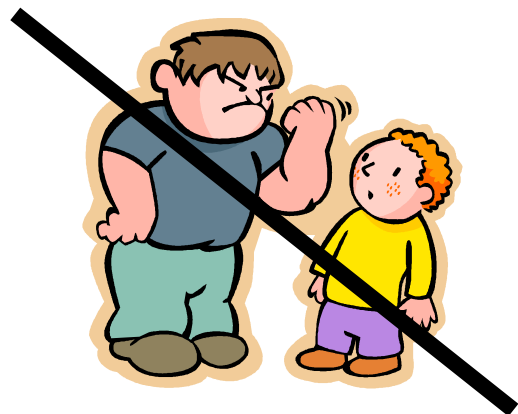

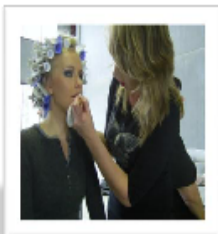
