

UNSW 2012 International Science Competition

Newcastle High School participated in the UNSW 2012 International Science Competition and demonstrated the outstanding talents of our students. Tom Maker (Year 10) received a High Distinction and Nicola Eenink (Year 7) received a Distinction Certificate. Samuel O'Sullivan and Marisa McLean (Year 7) both achieved a Credit in the examination. Thanks to Mr Crichton in Mathematics who coordinated the competition entries and Mr Bromfield who ran the science examinations.



Einstein Lecture at the Powerhouse Museum

Year 12 Physics attended the annual Einstein Lecture held at the Power House Museum. The event coincided with National Science Week and the Ultimo Science Festival. The lecture featured Dr Michael J. Biercuk who is an experimental physicist from the Centre for Engineered Quantum Systems at the University of Sydney. Michael runs a research group performing cutting-edge experiments using trapped atoms to study and exploit the strangest effects in quantum physics.

The lecture focused on an examination of the physics of the very small and very cold revealed just how different the quantum world is to our own. The discussion explored the wealth of bizarre phenomena that arise in quantum mechanics, and how we can exploit them to enable an entire generation of new technologies.


The Science faculty has introduced a Year 10 senior preparation elective which will run for the first time in 2013. The aim of the course is to get interested students participating in experimental science projects, conducting research and in so doing, develop skills that will enhance students' ability to succeed in HSC science courses.

Professor Lewis Keys, an *old boy* of Newcastle Boys High, has made a generous donation to promote the fields of Science and Engineering and to increase the numbers of students that move on to university in these fields. Professor Keys recently came to the school and visited a Year 8 science class who were engaged by his story. He later committed \$6000 to our school in order to purchase equipment that will increase scientific interest and curiosity. The school has since ordered some wonderful equipment including a speed gun, a thermal imaging camera and a UV spectrophotometer. These resources should be available for classes to use later this term.

Wetlands Excursion

Year 11 students from Senior Science, Biology and Earth and Environmental Science participated in a field study at Hunter Wetlands in Shortland in Term 3. Students undertook scientific methods to measure the distribution and abundance of different types of organisms inhabiting a wetland ecosystem. Students participated in collecting and identifying aquatic organisms to determine feeding relationships. This enabled the students to develop a food web for the ecosystem. The new education facilities at the Wetlands are extremely well equipped for this purpose. We would highly recommend a visit to the Wetland for families interested in the natural environment.

Cows Create Careers at NHS



Science students got up close and personal with some four-legged friends, when 'Jaffa' and 'Oreo' spent three weeks at NHS. As part of Dairy Australia's 'Cows Create Careers' program, Year 8 students were able to experience rearing two Holstein calves and learn about the variety of careers relating to agriculture and the Primary Industries.

The calves were housed at the base of the stairwell in the Science block and students ensured that the housing was warm, comfortable and secure. Twice a day students prepared bottles of milk formula to feed the calves, they measured and tracked their growth and 'mucked out' the pen. Their experiences were transformed into presentations and newsletters. At the end of the three weeks, the calves returned to their farm in Tocal.

A few weeks later, the students were able to visit their calves at the dairy. 'Matt the Farmer' happily reported that Jaffa and Oreo were at least 10kg ahead in their growth and asked if NHS could take in the whole herd next year! Students also toured the Tocal College and viewed the cattle judging and horse husbandry students in action. It certainly did appeal to some as a possible career choice!

NHS and Year 8 students would like to thank Matt Hogan and the Tocal Dairy, for again loaning us two precious calves. Thanks also to Mrs Kerry Kempton, who is employed by the Department of Primary Industries and was our ever helpful mentor. Thank you to the sponsors Dairy Australia who provide funding and milk formula.

Final thanks to the fantastic Year 8 students who showed great commitment, organisation, persistence, cooperation and willingness to get in and have a go! And thanks to the families and teachers who came in on the weekends to help look after the calves. It really showed what a great support network NHS has.



PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Having just browsed this edition The Parkway, I am delighted to celebrate and share with you the diversity and success of Newcastle High School, both within the local community, nationally and internationally! You will have read articles about sporting involvement, cultural achievements, academic achievement and a report from the students who participated in the excursion to Japan during the last holidays. All these wonderful achievements have only been possible due to the hard work of students, staff and parents. I really appreciate these efforts.

Last Thursday evening was a big night for the school. Along with our primary partner schools we celebrated the end of the 2012 Middle Schools Writing Project. Every Year 5 student from our partner schools participated and was mentored by a Year 8 student. The project was supported by the Newcastle Herald and I would like to thank Mr Ian Kirkwood for sharing his expertise and time with the students. The results were fantastic. Well done to all involved, particularly to Ms Ferguson and Ms Peachey and to Ms Emily Press from Hamilton South Public School for her support in the final stages of the project.

While this was happening, another group of students were providing a cooked evening meal for the residents of Ronald McDonald House. Again this was a great success and provided an opportunity for students to contribute to the greater good of our community. I received the following appreciative email:

"...it was great and the photos are up on Facebook. The leftovers got gobbled up fast too! We would love to have NHS come once a term, particularly if this also helps the students in their studies and also in taking what they are learning into a real life situation (that is greatly appreciated by the families in the House)....We all think it is a wonderful idea as we really appreciate the fantastic job the students have done to date. We would be keen to locate a corporate sponsor to meet the cost of the food so we could do this more often. This recent event was sponsored by the staff and school.

The school was named by Newcastle City Council as a winner in the Pride of Place awards. We have been given a sizable grant to improve the streetscape around the lower Smith gate and Room 42. The DEC is scheduled to repair and repaint this building so this part of the school should soon look as smart as the rest of the school. Ms Hines and Ms Allington worked with the SRC and Ms Rene Smith, P&C President, to write this application. Well done to these hard workers and what a great reward for the school. Thanks also to the gardening group who worked last Sunday and moved three piles of mulch around the school. Special thanks to Grant Smith who drove the dingo while the rest of us spread the mulch.

With all this great work and achievement I was very disappointed to have to provide amended anticipated student numbers to the Department of Education early this term. It is really unfortunate that a considerable number of families are not supporting Newcastle High School, the local high school. As a result, the school has been forced to reduce staffing numbers for 2013. Please spread the good news about the school in the community. Despite a fall in numbers three new head teachers have been appointed to the school. Ms Quinn Robertson has been appointed Head Teacher Special Education, Ms Valerie Kadarusman and Ms Lauren Wood have been appointed Head Teachers Administration. Congratulations to these teachers and thank you to the staff, parents and AECG members who served on the selection panels.

As this terms flies by at great speed the school is in full assessment mode and moving soon to reporting. The 2012 Year 12 cohort are completing their HSC exams and the current Year 11 students have begun their HSC course of study and have been issued with their 2013 HSC Assessment Schedule. Please make sure that Year 11 students are familiar with these requirements. All other students, including Year 10, are required to be at school until Wednesday, 19 December. Exemptions can be granted to students with legitimate excuses for absence. There are no School Certificate tests for Year 10 and students in this cohort will be awarded a

Record of School Achievement (ROSA) when they leave school, not at the end of year 10. I would also stress to parents that there is no such function as a Newcastle High School Year 10 Formal.

Presentation Night is on Wednesday, 12 December commencing at 7.00pm. We are trialling a different format this year with one ceremony for Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11. On Thursday, 13 December, year assemblies will be held for year groups and merit certificates and other awards will be presented to students.

A small group of staff are working on plans to reinvigorate sport and the reintroduction of Houses into the school. It is planned that this will commence from the start of 2013.

School uniform is looking very good, especially as the weather has warmed up and there is no need to wear non-uniform hoodies to school, but the warmer weather means we all sweat a bit more and male students need to wear school shorts and then change into their sports shorts, and not just wear their sports schools all day.

Newcastle MP, Tim Owen, has confirmed that 40kph pedestrian flashing lights will be installed along Parkway avenue in the near future. This improvement is welcomed, but I am still concerned about the number of selfish and dangerous drivers that park illegally in Parkway Ave every afternoon. Parking on the median strip and in the bus zone is dangerous and will contribute to an accident. There are additional pick up five minute parking spots in National Park Street that are rarely used. Everyone needs to be safety conscious around the school.

The government has announced that the 2013 rollout of laptops will be the last. Since 2009, 254,166 laptops have been delivered to Year 9 students. We have been asked to consider whether in 2013 we issue the laptops to the students or retain them in the school as class based sets for students to use in class for future years. This is a discussion that has commenced amongst the staff.

As you can read and see a very busy term is almost halfway over and your students are achieving great things across a range of school and extra-curricula activities.

SENIOR BOYS CRICKET

The onset of warmer weather and a new cricket season beckoning had the senior boys licking their lips at the chance of once again donning the creams and rejoining the fray. Winter reveries recalling the crack of leather on willow, a shout of 'howzat' and a sweltering summer's day were cast aside as the boys set to checking their gear and refining their style with a few practice super slo-mo shots in front of mum's bedroom mirror. As fate or chance would have it, their first foray of the spring would be an away fixture against a Morisset outfit brimming with confidence from victory over Toronto in their annual derby encounter...But that was over six months ago.

'All aboard', bellowed the guard as the team stowed their gear on the 8.28 from Broadmeadow and took their seats. Dora Creek was their destination and date with destiny. The stations glided

by as batting and bowling tactics flowed sporadically through the carriage, punctuated by moments of quiet reflection on individual goals.

A brief stroll down a sleepy rural avenue and they had arrived. Ten overs later, they were still there and Newcastle had belied their sharp warm-up with six uncharacteristic, dropped chances, both Hills and Crossley bearing their ill fortune with good humour. Just as the boys thought they might have missed their opportunity to seize the initiative, an intuitive bowling change by Terry had Simon Hills snaring the first wicket with a sharp caught and bowled. This proved to be the game defining moment and a catalyst that opened the floodgates to a sudden collapse. Despite the poor catching, both Hills Jr. and Crossley had tied Morisset down and a brief flurry of rash shots making from a panicked side saw Hills Sr. and Liam Dwyer reap the benefits with four scalps between them.

With Morisset reeling by the twentieth over, Newcastle took the field after drinks, determined to press home their ascendancy in the contest. Morisset, with the cream of their batting back in the shed, saw no point in hanging around and immediately launched a death or glory assault. However, the bowling and ground fielding proved too good and three wickets fell to the tempting guile of Jordan Rimmington. A smart run-out, also completed by Rimmington off his own bowling, and two stumpings to the ever vigilant Brian Difford saw Morisset all out for forty-two and facing imminent disaster. Tom Maker's appearance on the field after the twentieth over seemed to inspire the team and solid performances were displayed by Josh Richardson, Josh Bochenek and Lewis Kempton, who unselfishly had previously handed the gloves to an incapacitated Difford.

A brief lunch interval saw Crossley and Tim Studdert confidently approach the crease to begin the chase. A fluent on-drive for four off the first ball by Crossley set the tone for the remainder of the match. Both players stroked shots to all parts of the ground and ten overs later Newcastle had surpassed the required total for the loss of only one wicket, Crossley unbeaten on thirty-two.

The boys were gracious in victory, warmly congratulating the opposition on their efforts.

Before boarding the 1.29 they also contributed generously to the local economy with the purchase of supplies from a range of small businesses in the main street. To further encourage team bonding, Maker and Kempton involved all in a short but intense game of Trainball. What is Trainball? What happens on tour stays on tour.

At the end of Term 3 students from Years 8,9,10 and 11 attended the LOTE department's excursion to Japan. The excursion was organised by Ms Engel. Mr Guinane, from the Maths Faculty, was the support teacher accompanying the group. Ms Speight and Mrs Cook also joined the group. A wonderful time was had by all and despite a typhoon at the end of our stay, we all arrived home safely.

Several students have written accounts of their experiences:

As soon as we stepped out of the airport in Kansai Airport (near Osaka) we were doused with humidity, whereas in Sydney where we took off from was cold and icy winds blew. I preferred the heat a lot better.

The city was big and busy. This is pretty much how Tokyo is displayed in movies. As we caught the train to our hotel, I was surprised to see a giant factory building right next to a paddy field, and then suburban houses on the other side. And these were everywhere! Whereas Australia has city then outback and country before another city, Japan has both of them mixed up together.

There is just so much to take in when you get there. For example, the traditional walls and roofing tiles on the temple/hotels when you walk down the street. I barely saw any cats though. To be honest, all the food tastes kind of the same, well the vegetarian stuff anyway. Maybe that's just me. And most of the cakes or dango (little cake-lolly balls) are too sweet for my taste. But some of the dishes we had were simply excellent.

There was a lot of travelling which my stomach didn't really enjoy. But once we got to our destination I completely overcame the travel sickness because of all the sights to see and things to do. Everything is breathtakingly beautiful.

I've made heaps of friends too. People I never really knew before or even seen before are now cracking jokes with me and swapping stories. They do say 'Travel makes the bond of friendship stronger'.

The baths were so nice too. I haven't had a bath since I was 10 or something, only showers, so being enveloped by the warm water was amazing and I didn't really care that three other girls were in the bath with me too.

I've always wanted to go to Japan, no other country. The fact I was able to experience this while I'm still young is pretty good. I could have a lot more fun and do more things; like visit prize arcades, manga shops, kimono shops and the Pokémon Centre. It was pretty much heaven for me as I have wished I was born in Japan to have access to these things we don't have in Australia.

Meeting the kids our age in the school on Miyajima (an island off Hiroshima) was something I was most looking forward to. I've always wanted to speak fluently to a kid my age about things I like, and that's exactly what I did. I met a boy called Takumi and even though it was awkward at first, we just broke down into a full-on serious conversation about all the anime we like, recalling certain events and quotes. He spoke a bit of English, I speak a little Japanese, and so it worked out great.

The deer in Nara were adorable at first. Then they got hungry and thought my shorts were food so that was a little startling. I mean, I didn't expect a deer to want to eat me. But the further we got in, the nicer they got. They let us sit with them and pat them. One even bowed to us!!! We saw a baby deer with its mother and got to pet it. We got lots of photos.

Overall, the trip was great and I don't regret a single moment of it. If anyone is contemplating going to Japan on this trip I'd say do it. It's probable one of the best experiences of my life and I will always remember and cherish it. I plan to go back to Japan in the future.



Resilience is being able to adapt well to stressful situations in life such as family conflict, tragedy, mental health issues (depression, anxiety), failure at school, or the death of someone close. A person's ability to cope with a stressful situation depends on the personal skills they have, but can also depend on the situation – a person may be able to cope well in one situation, but not another. The good thing about resilience is that it's not a fixed characteristic in young people - they can learn the skills they need to cope with a range of stressful situations through parents, teachers, peers and other significant people in their lives. Parents can provide support at home and teachers can provide support at school.



On 20th November, Newcastle High is offering a wonderful opportunity to all students to learn to create their own video games.

By the time students arrive home after the event, they will be able to create their own commercial grade 3D world with hills, ocean, sky and trees which blow in the wind. They will also learn how to import vehicles to make a fun driving game, write simple artificial intelligence code, character animation code as well as learn the 12 most important coding concepts needed to create games for all major platforms, mobile devices and games consoles.

All students would benefit enormously from this experience.

Every student receives links to the free commercial grade development software, access to a library of game development resources and video tutorials to use at home valued at over \$3500 these resources include vehicle packs, 3D models, scripts, terrain tools, an amazing weather simulator and a fully scripted 10 level physics game.

The session will be run by the team from GameTraining and there will be teacher supervision at all times.

Cost: \$45 - 2 hour session - to be paid at the school front office.



Working Artist News




Each second Friday our working artist class goes on a walking excursion. We visit local art galleries and public artworks.

This rug will become part of a gift pack to families who come to stay, often from a long way away, and under difficult circumstances.


