FOOD AND TEXTILE TECHNOLOGY FACULTY

We are a dynamic and innovative faculty catering for the needs of our students. Our faculty has been able to achieve excellent results from our students participating in many diversified and creative courses. The following is an overview of the courses we offer.

Year 7

All students complete Technology Mandatory in Year 7, completing four units of study throughout the year. Two of these units of study are covered in the Food and Textile Technology area over one semester. The other two areas are completed in the traditional Industrial Arts area.

The aim of Technology Mandatory is to develop students' ability to design, produce and evaluate quality solutions that respond to identified opportunities and needs – this is achieved by giving students design projects. The two units we offer are "Just for Fun" and "Carried Away".






Carried Away is a unit where students are introduced to the world of textiles. Students develop their design skills by designing and making a carry bag.





Year 9 and 10 (Stage 5)

Child Care

Students with an interest and concern for the welfare of young children enjoy this course. Topics include the unborn child, infancy, food for toddlers, children's health.



Practical applications involve both food and textile activities.

As part of the Year 10 Childcare course students are learning about children's development in early childhood.



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The first Assessment Task is based around developing a learning book that develops a key learning skill.

Both classes have been participating in a community partnership with Frog Stomp Pre-school. In these sessions students have been observing the play of the young children to gather ideas for their books and then read through their finished learning books with the children.

This community partnership has been very effective in bringing together course content and real life situations. A special thanks to the friendly staff at Frog Stomp Pre-school; this experience has been very valuable for all involved!

Food Technology

Food Technology involves students investigating food through practical hands-on applications and processes. A range of themes for study includes food trends and food fads, food for special needs and food service and catering.





Textile Technology

Textiles Technology provides students with a broad knowledge of the properties, performance and uses of textiles in which fabrics, colouration, yarns and fibres are explored. Completion of projects is integral to developing skills and confidence in the use of textile materials, equipment and techniques.

These courses encourage students to be proactive, competent, creative, responsible and reflective learners able to take part in further study, work or training.





Events and Hospitality

This is a one year course in Year 10 which is divided into two areas. In Semester 1 the unit of work will be based on entertaining and learning basic food preparation and presentation skills. In Semester 2 the focus will be on event management.

Years 11 and 12 (Stage 6)

Our students achieve outstanding HSC results with many scoring in the top 10% of the state or achieving the best results in courses from this faculty. Our students often achieve marks that are well above state average.

Community and Family Studies



This course develops an understanding about society and its complex nature. Community and Family Studies draws upon selected components of family studies, sociology, development, psychology and students' general life experiences. It can have a direst and positive influence on the quality of students' lives, both now and in the future, by allowing students to:

- explore and form positive attitudes about themselves and others to develop an understanding of their relationship within their families and other groups
- To learn to work cooperatively and to appreciate the importance of effective communication
- Encourages students to become proactive members of society
 - Develops students' knowledge, skills and attitudes relevant to effective decision making leading to confidence and competence in solving practical problems in the management of everyday living.



Community and Family Studies is a Category A subject. It is an Academic Course which you can achieve a high ATAR in. In 2011, the maximum ATAR achieved by a student studying Community and Family Studies was 98.95. Over the last 11 years, 19 Band 6's have been achieved, often placing these students in the top 4% of the state. 49 Band 5's have been achieved, placing these students in the top 20-30% of the state. Results have been well above state average for the last 8 years.



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Design and Technology

This is a course for designers of tomorrow. This course provides creative and innovative students with the opportunity to study design and production as they face design challenges. Students will be required to develop, manage and complete a major design project where a design folio and practical project are undertaken. This contributes to 60% of their final HSC result.

As part of this course students attend a drawing workshop to gain skills in this area.



In Design and Technology at Newcastle High School students' major works often








Food Technology

An innovative program of activities involving students in many practical applications while developing an understanding of food issues in today's society. Production, processing and consumption of food and an appreciation of its impact on health, the economy and the environment are areas addressed in this course.



Food Technology is a Category A subject. It is an Academic Course which you can achieve a high ATAR in. In 2011, the maximum ATAR achieved by a student studying Food Technology was 98.95. In the last 11 years out of 12 the results have been above state average. Nine Band 6's and 50 Band 5's have been achieved over the last 10 years.

Exploring Early Childhood



The foundation of society depends on children's experiences. Studies in this course highlight the importance of the early childhood years. Students are really made to think about the responsibilities of parenthood as they care for *Baby Think it Over*, a computerised baby which stimulates a new born child.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Newcastle High School students have enjoyed success in a wide range of activities over the past month and have brought credit to themselves, their families, community and the school.

One of the many highlights was the evening of music and drama at Lizotte's restaurant on Tuesday, 21 August. Twenty-five musical items were performed by students from Years 7 to Year 12. This was a great opportunity for music and drama students to refine their performance skills. Thanks to Mr Gill and Ms Hudson, both our music teachers, who put the program together. The M.C.'s for the night were four talented Year 11 drama students who entertained with improvisations. Great work guys.

The previous week, Year 12 drama students performed their HSC pieces for parents and friends in the Drama Room, a smaller audience than Lizottes, but again excellent performances. Thanks to Mr Villari for his work with these students.

The Higher School Certificate is underway. This week Industrial Technology markers were in the school marking projects completed in Industrial Technology Wood. Congratulations to many of these students on the quality of their work. I would like to mention Kionee Box, who designed and built this beautiful hall stand. As one of the schools senior female Aboriginal students she did a great job in this male dominated subject. Thanks to Mr Prior who taught these students. Visual arts, music and language students all have their work assessed in the coming weeks.



Year 12 students have been provided with information regarding their graduation from Newcastle High School. I would like to reiterate to the school community that leaving school is a time to celebrate and exit with dignity and grace and it is not an opportunity for any students to engage in antisocial or criminal behaviour. The Year 12 Advisors have put together a program of events to celebrate this milestone for students, with the Graduation Formal on Tuesday, 18 September followed by a breakfast on Wednesday 19th September and the Graduation Assembly on Thursday, 20 September. A lot of work and effort goes into organising these events and the school has a policy, endorsed by the P&C, that graduating students need to have paid all outstanding fees before they can attend the Formal and breakfast.



Representatives from the 2011 Year 12 cohort attended a school assembly recently and presented the school with a set of male and female sporting tops, for students to wear when they represent the school. This was a wonderful gift and will enhance the image of the school when students play representative sport.

Next year the school will have two additional support classes. These classes will support students with special needs and the majority of these students will come from our local drawing area. Staffing arrangements for these classes are yet to be finalised.

Thanks to the families who hosted the French exchange students earlier this term. I have received lots of positive feedback from the students and the organisers of the exchange. Ms Engel and Mr Guinane are about to set off for Japan with a group of students during the upcoming holidays.

Jenny Wallace, in Year 11, has successfully completed a semester of university study through the Career Acceleration Program. This program is one of the programs offered to students through the Newcastle Community Trade Training Centre and allows students to commence university study while still at school.

Tim Owen MP, has contacted me to advise that flashing pedestrian lights will be installed in Parkway Avenue to improve road safety for our students. Mr Owen has also facilitated contact between the school and a group of church volunteers who have offered to paint the exterior area between the canteen and the J block toilets. This dark wind swept area is often referred to as "the tunnel" so hopefully a coat of light paint will brighten up the area.

Congratulations to the Aboriginal Education team who organised the



school's celebration of NAIDOC week. The highlight for me was watching our big Year 10 boys play touch football with the students from the local primary schools. Their pride and caring for the younger students was impressive.

We are well underway with planning for 2013. A subject information evening is scheduled for Tuesday, 4 September with Year 8, 2013 parents and students coming between 5.30 and 6.30pm and Year 9, 2013 students and parents coming between 6.30 and 7.30pm. Information booklets will be distributed before these meetings to allow students and parents/carers time to think about subject choices. The finalised lines for subjects will be distributed to Year 11, 2013 this week.

Don't forget parent/teacher afternoon on Tuesday, 11 September commencing at 3.15pm. The staff are looking forward to meeting you. Students are welcome to attend. I do appreciate that some teachers do get very busy, but from years of experience, the process we have does work if everyone is patient. These evenings are not the time to have long in depth meetings, as the time allocated for each chat is five minutes. Appointments should be made with appropriate staff for longer Learning Support Team meetings. These can be made at any time by contacting the school office.

With spring on our doorstep the gardening group is planning a mulching working bee and would like to borrow, hire or beg the use of a bobcat to assist in moving the large amount of mulch that has been donated to the school. If you are able to source a small bobcat please contact me.

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ATTENDANCE OF STUDENTS IN TERM 4, 2012

With the removal of School Certificate tests and introduction of the Record of School Achievement (ROSA) in 2012, all students, excepting those undertaking Higher School Certificate examinations, will be required to attend school up until the last day of teaching.

As school staff are involved in school development days at the end of Term 4 in 2012, all students are required to be in attendance until the third last day of Term 4, Wednesday, 19 December 2012. Prior to this date, programs for students in all year groups should be based upon the achievement of outcomes as appropriate to curriculum and syllabus requirements.

Where parents are seeking permission for their child not to be at school for a period of time the matter should be dealt with using the <u>Exemption from School -</u> <u>Procedures.</u>



NAIDOC WEEK 2012

NAIDOC celebrations are held around Australia in July each year to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people across our community. Parents and students from NHS and our local primary schools participated in a number of cultural events from 23rd to 27th July 2012.





Mon 23rd July:

The "Sea of Hands" were placed around our school cottage and used symbolically to recognise human rights, respect and connection to land.

Students learnt about sovereignty, land rights, human rights, respect, understanding acceptance and diversity. Students were encouraged to write their own personal messages of support for reconciliation and change.

Tue 24th July:

Students were treated to a didjeribone performance by Tjupurru who is a proud descendant of the Djabera Djabera of Western Australia's Kimberley area.

Tjuppuru played a unique slide didjeridu, through a seismic transducer and a range of electronic effects.





Wed 25th July:

Students across Years 7 – 11 were given a lesson around using Traditional Symbols, learning about their significance and their meaning.

Students created one of two reconciliation poles. This pole was set aside to acknowledge all the work of our AEO Belinda Wright.

Belinda has been working at Newcastle High for 15 years and we thought that it was important to celebrate and recognise all the great work Belinda has done for our youth in our community.

NAIDOC GARDEN

Wed 25th & Thurs 26th July

Students from Years 7 to 11 helped landscape; design and create an Indigenous Native Garden and Outdoor Learning Space for our School.

Students had to research the benefits of native species and learn about the traditional uses for each species of plant such as how they were used for food and medicine.





Students from Years 7 to 10 helped dig out the garden area/space, cultivating soil, removing grass and weeds and planting shrubs.



We would like to acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land that our school is on, the Awabakal People.

We would like to pay respect to the elders of the Awabakal nation both past and present.

We honour the presence of our ancestors who reside in the imagination of this land and whose spirituality connects us all together.

Sydney Japanese School/ NHS Exchange Program

For the past seven years our Year 7 students have enjoyed our annual excursion each winter to the Sydney Japanese School (SJS) located at Terrey Hills. This year for the first time a home stay and student exchange program was also initiated between our two schools.

Seven of our Year 7 and 8 students were chosen to stay with Japanese families from SJS in July. They were Lucas Hodge, Zachery Aislabie, Joshua Dare, Monique Collin, Jackson Blyth, Kynan Ward and William Hudson. In October there will be a return visit when the Japanese students will come to Newcastle and stay with the NHS families for four days. Our students represented the school well and below are some accounts of their experiences.

The Japanese excursion was a really fun and educational way to see Japanese culture. The four days I had with Keisuke and his family taught me more of the language, the traditional food and the respectful way they live their life. Some of the things I liked most were the sushi, the miso soup and the cooking classes at the school where we started our own fire, cooked our lunch and cooked American size marshmallows. Overall my experience with my Japanese family was fun and I would definitely do it again. *Monique Collin 7 Scott*




20 September - 1 October

Local Schools, Local Decisions

A MESSAGE TO SCHOOL COMMUNITIES FROM THE NSW MINISTER FOR EDUCATION

Right now the New South Wales Government is working with schools to advance the most far reaching changes to school education in this state in over a century – changes that are going to help all our public schools meet the challenges of education well into the future.

Nothing better illustrates this than the new way we are going to fund our public schools. We are putting students at the heart of all decision making.

On July 23 I announced the new Resource Allocation Model, known as the RAM. This delivers on my promise to change the way NSW public schools receive their funding. School communities need to have this important information.

The new RAM is central to the Local Schools, Local Decisions reform. Under the new model schools will see more of the total public school education budget and they will have more authority over how to spend it.

In NSW we are increasing the funding that goes directly to public schools to more than 70% of the total public school education budget, up from the current 10%.

The RAM takes into account the fact that students and school communities are not all the same; they have different needs and will need different levels of support. We cannot improve outcomes for individual students with an out-dated cookie cutter funding model.

The new model will provide certainty of funding for schools to employ teachers in order to adhere to the class sizes policy. No principal need worry about the cost of a teacher, principals will be able to choose teachers based on their quality and skills required to best meet the needs of their students.

The RAM will also reduce red tape. I want our principals to be innovative educational leaders, free from the constraints of too much bureaucracy. Instead of hundreds of small funding buckets to be managed and reported on, schools' resource allocation will be divided into two components. The first will see money quarantined for staffing purposes only. These resources cannot be used for anything else. The remaining component will fund all other operational requirements of the school and any discretionary needs, which may include employing additional staff.

I am sure that you will be wondering if this is going to be better than the way schools have been funded in the past. It was always an issue for schools and their communities when a small change in enrolment numbers meant a significant change in resources. Under our current model, one or two students leaving can result in the loss of a teacher and changes to classes that impact on the students and the school community. The RAM will help fix this problem but it won't happen overnight. It will take two to three years for implementation across all of our schools.

These changes need to be right for every school across NSW so before we finalise the model we are rigorously testing it across a range of school settings. When new funding under the RAM is received in the first group of schools it will be fairer, more transparent, and it will enable schools to plan more effectively with their communities.

If your school is part of the Empowering Local Schools National Partnership, some changes will happen faster than in other schools. These schools will be the first ones to be funded under this new model and will be able to involve their school communities in the allocation of resources to identified areas. Other schools will be funded by the RAM over the next two years.

The RAM will include loadings for socio-economic status, Aboriginality, English Language Proficiency and students with disability, as well as loadings for school size and location. It will provide a loading for each of these factors to ensure equity for our students.

This is a funding model that is student focused. It is simpler, fairer and transparent. And it will give schools funding stability so a small change in circumstances doesn't lead to a big change in resources.

It is the critical financial enabler of everything we are trying to achieve under Local Schools, Local Decisions; build an even better public school culture; one that promotes creativity and innovation, where the staff in our schools are willing, and supported, to try out new things.

A culture that supports a principal with ideas, energy and a willing school community, to innovate and know they'll be supported, not second guessed by head office.

It's a big change and a long overdue recognition of the capability and professional judgement of the leaders in our schools and of the importance of local decision-making in ensuring NSW continues to have a great public school system.






To Whom It May Concern:
