On the 13th of August the Newcastle High team and a number of supporters took the long journey to Hollymount Oval at Bulli to take on the South Coast champions, Narooma High.

In blustery conditions Newcastle High had the task of kicking into the wind during the first quarter. Quick early goals by the accurate and skilful Narooma High team saw Newcastle on the back foot. With a determined effort in the midfield

from Clarence Playford, James Mehan, and Felix Pritchard and the added starch of Jaiden Harrison in defence, the Newcastle High forward line was able to gain more possession of the football. Jack Johnson-Holmes and Isaac McGrady began to create problems for the Narooma High defence and Newcastle High clawed their way back into the match.

An arm wrestle for mid field dominance ensued during the second and third quarters resulting in the scores being locked up at three quarter time. A big wrap must be given to Ollie Nash who competed to his very best all day in ruck contests around the ground against Narooma's state representative ruckmen Jai Reed. With Newcastle looking like having the advantage of the breeze in the last quarter the team and their enthusiastic supporters had growing confidence.

With the ball up for the last quarter the wind unexpectedly dropped and with that Newcastle's advantage was lost. Despite gallant efforts to attack the ball and chase any Narooma opponents, the skill of the more experienced Narooma team resulted in a four goal loss to Newcastle High. The final score: Narooma 9.5.61 to Newcastle High 5.3.33.

Their efforts have seen Newcastle High go the furthest that we have ever been in recent times in AFL making it to the last 16 public schools in the state.




Science Faculty


It has been a big year for the Science Faculty at Newcastle High School. There have been many events and opportunities for students to experience and enjoy science. A sample of these are outlined below.


NHS Thermal images - A Science Week perspective
















Science and Engineering Challenge - Year 10

Ms Lidden took thirty Year 10 students to compete in the Science and Engineering Challenge. Whilst not winning the event, our students impressed the judges with their ingenuity and teamwork. Students were then selected to be instructors in the primary challenge event held on Wednesday, 9 September.







Solar Collector - CSIRO Newcastle

Mr Rule took a group of senior Physics student to the CSIRO Newcastle facility. Students were able tour the facility, talk to the scientists and examine the photo collector array. The techniques developed and refined in Newcastle may point the way to affordable solar electricity generation in Australia.

Aurecon Bridge Building Challenge

Mr Doherty mentored three Year 9 students in the design and construction of a bridge with strict equipment limitations for the international Aurecon bridge building challenge. The team went to Sydney Art Gallery and competed against schools from across the State. The bridge held 11.2 kg before cracking under the strain, placing them in the middle of the field.

Cows Create Careers

Ms Longobardi coordinated the Cows Create Careers program in 2015. Year 8 students cared for two calves, feeding, cleaning and monitoring their development over a two week period. Students also researched the dairy industry and prepared a portfolio of work to be evaluated at Tocal Agricultural College. This year, Newcastle High won the title of best school for the third time in a row. Congratulations to the students and thanks to Ms Longobardi for her organisation.

Linked Program Mural

The "Linked" boys' program is aimed at engaging students and providing opportunities for the group to contribute positively to the school and community. As part of this process and guided by Mr Villari, the boys designed and painted a Science mural at the entryway into the department. They have done a great job!

Year 10 Bar Beach Adventure

Year 10 Science students studying evolution went to Bar Beach to examine rock strata, coal and fossil deposits. Students examined some of our local coastal geological formations and found petrified wood and other interesting rocks.

Cells, more cells and still more cells

Year 7 has been working on cell models and have come up with interesting ways to represent and present information on cell structures. Some of them have tasted quite nice!

Fantastic Chemistry

Senior Chemistry classes have visited Newcastle TAFE and Orica, using specialist chemical analysis equipment and investigating a modern industrial chemical plant.


Museum of Human Disease


STELR Resources
