Maths Report

As the nature of teaching and learning changes, students at Newcastle High School have increasing opportunities to appreciate the relevance of maths in all aspects of their lives. With the ongoing introduction of Project Based Learning, the often repeated question "When are we ever going to need this?" is becoming redundant. Instead, with Project Based Learning, students are able to see the relevance of maths in solving real world problems.

Two classes of Year 9 students engaged in Project Based Learning as they worked on a history — maths project to address the question "Which World War was an Australian soldier more likely to survive?". Students were required to research two aspects of both world wars, such as weapons, tactics or illnesses. Students needed to research and compare data and information, in regards to the experiences of Australian soldiers. The challenge for students was to ensure that they didn't just present facts about the two world wars. Students were expected to draw conclusions and form their own opinion, based on their research.

One student, Spencer Mowle, investigated the weapons used and the illnesses suffered by Australian soldiers. At the exhibition he presented his report and was able to justify his opinion that World War Two was far more brutal for Australian soldiers. Well done, Spencer!



This term we welcomed Mr Dylan Gambrill to the maths staff as a permanent member. Dylan is a keen mathematician and passionate teacher. He has already introduced some alternative learning activities to engage students in their learning and see the relevance of maths in practical applications.

Maths Report

Next term we will be joined by Ms Samone Dinnery, who has also been appointed to the maths faculty as a permanent member of staff. Samone is currently working at the Cooks Hill Campus, so we are looking forward to sharing the Big Picture ideas she will bring with her. I wish to extend my thanks to Ms Trisch LaSorsa, who has been working hard to help students achieve their best in Terms 2 and 3.

The learning possibilities provided through Project Based Learning, Innovative Teaching and 21st Century Digital Technologies are endless. It is becoming increasingly necessary that students bring their own computer device to school. Students have access to Microsoft One Drive and the Google suite of applications, as well as many other excellent applications that can enhance learning and help students organise their resources. When students bring their own laptop or tablet to school they enjoy continuity with their work rather than relying on USBs, compatible software and email attachments, to transfer work between computers. It's a straightforward process for students to add their computer to the school wireless network.

Year 12 students are beginning to approach the end of their coursework, allowing time for revision and study. The students should be going through their trial papers to determine areas of weakness. They should also be completing past HSC questions to enhance their understanding. The Year 12 students are also encouraged to attend the tutorial sessions on a Monday afternoon in the Library and Breakfast Club on a Wednesday morning. A Senior Study area has also been established, with a teacher present during periods 2 and 3 on most days, in the Library.

Breakfast Club on a Wednesday morning continues to operate thanks to the generous donation of time by Mr Sam Crichton. All students, Year 7 to 10, are welcome to attend from 7:45am to 8:45am, every week to access tutoring support in maths. During this time students can catch up on homework, ask about work they are doing in class or revisit previous work to improve their understanding. We even provide Milo, milk and toast.

Some of our maths teachers have been busy this year engaging in professional learning in preparation for the introduction of a new syllabus in Year 11 Mathematics. In 2018 students who would have studied General Mathematics will now study Mathematics Standard. There have been quite a few changes within the coursework to be delivered, compared to the General Maths course. Most notable is the introduction of the topic of Networks in Year 12. Also, a limit on the number of assessment tasks has been introduced, with one task required to be an investigation or project style task rather than an examination.

Teacher Profile: Sam Crichton

Sam is a wonderful asset to the maths faculty and to Newcastle High School. He is passionate about maths and about quality learning and is often sharing information and ideas with other staff members about ways to engage students and introduce innovative teaching in the classroom. Sam has developed a great relationship with many of the students at our school. He is a tireless worker in the staff room and often seamlessly steps into my Head Teacher shoes when I am out of the school. He also makes himself available to support students outside the maths classroom. Each year he often helps HSC music students by playing an instrument during the HSC performance tasks.

I asked Sam 10 questions to find out more.

How long have you worked at Newcastle High? 9 years, I think.

Why did you become a maths teacher? Love of numbers and I enjoy helping people.

The way we teach maths is changing, how do you feel about these changes? Excited

You don't work Thursdays, at the moment. So, what do you enjoy doing on Thursdays? I love doing things with my beautiful daughters. So, we do baby music lessons in the morning and then spend the afternoon at the park.

If you could teach a Passion Project with Year 7, what would it be about? Something with coding; I think we can do so much with coding and there is so much room to play and to link in with computers.

You like to run. Do you have any running goals at the moment? Yes, I want to run 5km in 25 minutes, then move on to 10km in 50 minutes.

What's the most important skill for a student to learn in maths? The ability to problem solve and not give up.

How many musical instruments can you play, and what's your favourite? I can play 3 instruments, but I love playing the viola. I play with the Christ Church Camerata in four concerts throughout the year.

How do you rate yourself at handball? I am a master!

If you hadn't become a teacher, what career path would you have followed? I would have loved to follow astronomy, but there are not a lot of career options in that. If I changed careers now, I'd love to move into robotics.

Attendance Report

Attendance Interview Day

Regular attendance at school is a key factor in the education of your child. NSW policy states that parents must ensure children who are enrolled at school attend every day the school is open for their instruction. Parents are also expected to provide an explanation for absences by means such as a telephone call, written note, text message or email to the school within 7 days from the first day of any period of absence. After this 7 day period absences will remain on your child's record as unjustified absences.

On **Wednesday 9 August** the school hosted a team of Home School Liaison Officers and Aboriginal School Liaison Officers visiting to interview students who have been identified by the school as having attendance concerns. The interviews took place in the Library and students were withdrawn from class in order to participate.


If your child was interviewed they should have brought home a letter and a copy of their attendance record for this year. Please complete the reply section and return it to school for collection in roll call.

Year 9 NAPLAN results and the HSC minimum standard Message from NESA

HSC minimum standard required to receive the HSC from 2020

Literacy and numeracy skills are the foundation for success in life after school. This is why eligibility for the HSC is changing. From 2020, students will need to show they have the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to complete everyday tasks.

Your child will have a number of opportunities from Year 9 to Year 12, and even after the HSC to show they meet the HSC minimum standard

Some students will meet the requirement early through their Year 9 NAPLAN results in reading, writing and numeracy. However, most students will show they meet the standard by passing short, online reading, writing and numeracy tests in Years 10, 11 or 12.

The writing test will require students to respond to a question about a prompt or stimulus.

Year 9 NAPLAN reports available in mid-August

Your child's Year 9 NAPLAN report will indicate which online HSC minimum standard test/s (if any) they will need to pass to be eligible for the HSC certificate. Remember your child has three more years of learning before the HSC and can take the HSC minimum standard online tests in Years 10, 11 or 12. Year 9 NAPLAN is a good chance to check they are on track or get support to meet the minimum standard by Year 12.

If your child has achieved a Band 8 or above in reading, writing or numeracy, the NAPLAN report will indicate that they have "Met the HSC minimum standard early" in the respective area/s.

Your child can sit the online HSC minimum standard tests when they are ready

There are three separate 45 minute online tests: reading, writing and numeracy. Students don't have to pass all three tests at once and can attempt each test up to twice a year. The reading and numeracy tests each contain a maximum of 45 multiple choice questions. You can try some sample reading and numeracy questions at https://hscliteracynumeracy.nesa.nsw.edu.au/

Schools test readiness for NAPLAN Online

In August and September, schools around the country will have an opportunity to assess their readiness to move to NAPLAN Online in 2018. The school readiness test aims to ensure each school is prepared to undertake NAPLAN Online and has sufficient bandwidth and wireless connectivity. The test will give state and territory education authorities valuable feedback about the extent of school readiness to undertake NAPLAN Online from 2018.

Teachers will practise managing the classroom logistics for an online assessment as well as the processes for administering the test.

Schools across Australia will start to go online from 2018 on an opt-in basis. State and territory education authorities are responsible for determining when their state/territory moves to NAPLAN Online. These education authorities are preparing schools for the move from the current paper-based NAPLAN tests to online-based assessments, supporting schools with a variety of readiness tools, activities and training, including this readiness test exercise for selected schools.

"States and territories have previously undertaken trialing in preparation for the move to NAPLAN Online," ACARA CEO Robert Randall said. "During August 2016, students from more than 1,000 selected schools across the country took part in a trial of the assessment platform for NAPLAN Online. Feedback received from the 2016 trial was generally positive and will be used together with this year's readiness testing to ensure schools have a smooth transition."

NAPLAN Online will allow for a wider range of question types and a broader range of skills to be assessed. It will also feature tailored testing, where the test automatically responds to student performance, providing more, or less, demanding questions based on how a student has gone in previous sections. This means that NAPLAN Online will provide more precise results and a more engaging test experience for students.

When NAPLAN moves online, test results will also be available within weeks instead of several months under current arrangements. This will assist teachers to identify learning priorities and meet individual student needs earlier than with the current NAPLAN paper tests.

As technology develops, ACARA aims to further refine the delivery of the tests to best use the available technology as well as to provide increasingly sophisticated assessments and valuable feedback to teachers, parents and education authorities.

Significant planning, development, research and trialing have been ongoing since 2012 to support the move to NAPLAN Online. ACARA has established a demonstration site to help students and teachers familiarise themselves with NAPLAN Online, as well as the types of items to be included in the online tests. The public demonstration site is available at www.nap.edu.au

ACARA and Education Services Australia are working with the Australian Government and all states and territories on the move to NAPLAN Online. States and territories are responsible for preparing schools for NAPLAN Online and selecting schools for readiness testing.

Newcastle High School will be taking part in this trial during Week 9 of this term. Year 7 and 9 students will participate in a school readiness test between 11-15 September 2017. More information will sent to parents regarding this process.
