Enrolments and non-local (out of zone) enrolments

Currently we have very few vacancies for non-local (out-of-zone) enrolments. A new enrolment policy has been established for Newcastle High School as part of broader reforms across all NSW public schools. Part of the new procedures include an enrolment cap, based on space in a school, and determined by the facilities available. All non-local enrolment applications are considered by a panel and families are then notified by letter if we are able to proceed with an enrolment.

We are required to maintain a small buffer of spaces for local enrolments and demand for non-local enrolment in our school is currently very high. We have several students on waiting lists hoping for a place to become available. Together with a strong number of enrolments for the current Year 7 (2019), this is a sign of confidence in our school.



This year has been an incredibly busy year for our students in sport. Our students then developed their cricket skills by working with Liam, who helped with catching and throwing techniques and we were then lucky enough to work with Cricket NSW staff during a skills day at Lambton, along with Irrawang HS students. The stakes were high and the competition was fierce but our boccia team came away with the win and moved onto the State Boccia Championships at Homebush. This is a great opportunity for our students to engage with each other, participate in physical activity and explore our environment. Mrs Kenneally and Paula love getting to know the students outside the classroom and we enjoy seeing the students move out of their comfort zones by doing things they wouldn't normally do!

Room 2 often utilise Newcastle buses, trains, the ferry and light rail and have increased their self-confidence in navigating the public transport options around Newcastle. Students' money handling, time management and self management skills have been put to the test and we have observed our students' improvements in these areas.

Monday is the biggest day of the week for Room 2, but it is a fantastic way to start each week. We are often proud of the students' resilience, tenacity, and self discipline on this quite often, physically challenging day.









Room 3

Room 3 has had an eventful year so far. Students have worked hard in class, in electives and in the community to produce and experience some great things. The Year 7s in Room 3 started off the year with a three day camp where they got to have a go at rope courses, flying foxes, archery, waterslides, giant drops, rock climbing and lots of fun games with their peers. We have been on lots of Community Access excursions so far this year, including the Science and Coal exhibitions at the Newcastle Museum, the interactive Watt Space "Brain" exhibition and checked out the erosion at Stockton Beach. We have also kept fit doing the Newcastle ANZAC Memorial walk and rock climbing at Clip and Climb.

In the classroom we have been busy at work. During our measurement unit of work, students designed a taco truck with its own menu. They then made and sold delicious Mexican food to the support staff... we even got to visit Guzman and Gomez to have a taste test of some Mexican food.

Throughout the year Room 3 has shown a passion for animals with the rescue and release of two injured birds and a visit from two very fluffy bunnies.













Room 5

Students in Room 5 are constantly engaged in education in school and in the local community. When not in electives with their year they are extending their literacy and numeracy skills, discovering where they belong in the world and how everything works.

Recycling is a priority at Newcastle High School and Room 5 students are involved within the school and the wider community participating again in the Waste to Art 2019 exhibition currently on display at SEEN Gallery and in the Swansea reusing and upcycling of everyday items.

Gifts made for Father's or Parent Day was another opportunity for the students to recycle, with the use of timber from pallets repurposed with the addition of decorative glass beads.



The cooking expertise of basic snacks and prepared foods is improving and the activity is fast becoming a highlight of Room 5 students on Fridays with cups of soup, two minute noodles, pasta meals, toasted sandwiches and sausages and gravy with toast on the menu.

Every year Newcastle High School Special Education unit hosts two themed daytime discos inviting peers from Newcastle and the Lower Hunter Region high schools, special schools and feeder primary schools in June and December. It is a great opportunity to interact with friends old, maybe from primary school, and new.

Community based activities allow students to generalise in school learning and the opportunity to experience new activities and visit new places.

Fortnightly the Belmont 16s courtesy bus collects the students from the front of the school to attend Sailabilty at Belmont. Students have the opportunity to sail in an ACCESS dinghy with a volunteer and train towards becoming a solo sailor like Casi in Year 9.

Excursions this year have included visits to Lambton Pool for swimming and water safety activities during Term 1, Stockton Beach and the breakwall, Toronto rail walk and foreshore, ten pin bowling at Charlestown, the Fort Scratchley Tunnel Tour and the behind the scenes Woolworths tour at Kotara.

Term 4 is shaping up to being just as busy with sailing on Newcastle Harbour with Sailors with a Disability, the annual concert and Year 12 graduation at Callaghan College Jesmond Senior Campus, which will host the

Christmas disco and movie day.



Marine and Aquaculture Technology Report

Recently the Marine and Aquaculture Technology class has had two excursions. Friday 30 August, Ms Ronald, Ms Ortiger and a parent, Mrs Edwards, along with seventeen students had a fantastic day when we caught the train to Sydney and went to Sea Life Sydney Aquarium and then Madame Tussauds.

The class were able to see manta rays, coral reef habitats, shark feedings, penguins and dugongs. Some students participated in the Sea Life virtual reality program. We then concluded the excursion at Madame Tussaud's. A fantastic day!



Marine and Aquaculture Technology Report

Irukandji Port Stephens - Shark and Ray Centre.

Year 9/10 Marine and Aquaculture Technology group excursion.

On the September 13, Ms Ronald and Ms Ortiger, along with 19 students, visited the Shark and Ray Centre. The day started with a tour, where students had the opportunity to feed prawns and shrimp to various species of rays such as shovel-nose, estuary, blue-spotted fantail and butterfly.

The Shark and Ray Centre's aim is to develop conservation and appreciation for both sharks and rays. Their goal is to show the wider community that these animals are special and intelligent creatures to be preserved. The staff stated that, ever since the death of Steve Irwin, people have had a mis-conceived idea that rays are dangerous and their populations have dropped. However, the Marine and Aquaculture Technology class discovered they are affectionate and intelligent creatures deserving to be protected and preserved for our future generations.

We learnt that sting rays are really not dangerous animals at all and have quirky personalities. We learnt that they can respond to the keepers by name and they can detect the individual voices of trainers. We learnt that they actually have a lot of personality and are very social and responsive creatures.

We were also able to feed some sharks such as Port Jackson sharks and some wobbegongs and were able to pat puffer and star fish.

We found the skin of sharks was rough, like sand paper, and the skin of rays was slimy. There are antibacterial properties in the slime to help the rays heal quickly from any cuts or bruises they may encounter, particularly when feeding near rock or corals close to the shore line.

To end the day when we arrived back in Newcastle, we walked over to the Newcastle Yacht Club where some local members very kindly gave Newcastle High Students a tour of the yacht club as well as a tour of their personal yachts.. sharing stories of some of the activities and adventures they have been on and expressing ways for youth in our community to get involved. A very generous gesture from the yacht club.

All in all we had a blast; it was a very educational and fun day!
